





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All linked up.

We're big on links. Our 850-mile shoreline is studded with coastal courses that burst with history and personality. You'll want to make a connection with all of them, but here are four highlights from Wales Golf editors Huw and Roger Thomas to get you started as you edge your way around Wales.





Conwy Trailblazing, heavyweight links

Game on

It takes something pretty special to stand out in a North Wales golf scene that boasts almost 50 great courses, but Open qualifying and 2020 Curtis Cup host Conwy is definitely up to the challenge. A must-visit for any links lover, this is golf as it was always meant to be played – an elemental experience combining natural hazards with careful course design. It may appear quite flat at first glance, but the unpredictable winds blowing in off the Irish Sea mean you can't take anything for granted. 'Awesome' is how European Ryder Cup legend Sam Torrance describes Conwy.

What's the story?

Conwy's rugged terrain has a golfing history that predates the club's formation in 1890. In 1869, three visiting Scotsmen laid out a few holes here for their own amusement, possibly becoming the first people to play golf on Welsh soil in the process. Today, Conwy's mighty links bear little resemblance to their roughand-ready predecessor, but it's easy to see why those early visitors were so keen to hit a few balls here.

Top hole

Stand on the elevated tee of the 441-yard, par-four seventh and you're rewarded with eye-catching views of the Isle of Anglesey and the jutting limestone peninsula of Great Orme further along the coast. You'll need to concentrate on your golf though. Successfully negotiate a testing trio of fairway bunkers and a good second will bring you to a punchbowl green nestled almost at the water's edge.

Après Conwy. Now what?

Enjoy more great sea views across to the Great Orme headland from Signatures restaurant. Praised as 'Favourite Place

to Eat in Wales' in the 2013 National Tourism Awards, in the words of its owners Louise and Jimmy Williams (he's the chef) it combines 'city chic with true Welsh hospitality'. It's a theatrical as well as foodie experience – you can watch your dishes being prepared in the theatrestyle kitchen.

Royal St David's, Harlech A truly regal round

Game on

With a reputation as the world's toughest par-69, Royal St David's is not for the faint-hearted. Set on land vacated by the sea only a few centuries ago, its towering dunes, undulating fairways and fast, true greens will challenge even the most able players. Featuring a dizzying selection of holes that vary in both length and direction, you'll need every club in your



bag to achieve a low score. You won't be alone though. Harlech Castle, perched on a rocky outcrop at the course's edge, is a constant companion.

What's the story?

Despite the name, St David never actually played a round here. Seeing the success of St Andrews in Scotland and St George's in England, the club's founders engaged in an early form of branding by associating their course with Wales's own patron saint. The Royal connection is a little more concrete. King Edward VII granted his patronage in 1908, while the Prince of Wales - later Edward VIII - captained the club in 1934.

Top hole

The elevated tee of the 352-yard, parthree 16th provides some of the course's best views of brooding Harlech Castle. Guarded on three sides by an array of waiting bunkers, the green seems almost as impenetrable as the mighty fortress that overlooks it. Think carefully before you begin your assault.

Après Royal St David's. Now what?

It's been there, hovering over your shoulder every time you played a shot. You can't come to Harlech without visiting its clifftop castle. The fortress is a World Heritage Site along with places like the Taj Mahal and the Leaning Tower of Pisa, so it's in good company. Soak up its gritty, authentic medieval spirit from the battlements – and also pop into the castle's visitor centre for a high-tech look into its fiery 800-year history.

Ashburnham A fine vintage

Game on

Founded in 1894. Ashburnham is one of Wales's oldest links courses. Over a century into its life, it remains a defiantly old-school prospect. If you fancy testing vour skills on the purest of coastal links – in all their rugged and ragged glory - this is the club for you. Hummocked dunes and lightning-quick greens provide a stern test for players, with the breeze blowing in off Carmarthen Bay adding a further layer to the challenge.

What's the story?

Over the course of its history, Ashburnham has played host to competitions such as the PGA Championship and the Home International Championship – as well as serving as a qualifying venue for the 2014

and 2017 Senior Open Championship. Success here can be a precursor to bigger things. Dai Rees, Bernard Gallagher and Sam Torrance all won tournaments at Ashburnham before going on to become Ryder Cup captains. Even the legendary player Harry Vardon was a fan, the sixtime Open winner describing it as 'the course I like best in Wales.'

Top hole

The 191-yard, par-three sixth may not be the longest hole in Ashburnham's bag, but it's one of the trickiest. If your tee shot fades to the right, you'll be left with a very difficult chip to a green protected by a selection of slopes, mounds and bunkers.

Après Ashburnham. Now what?

We hope you're not all linked out for we have more sandy experiences in store for you – in fact, Wales's longest sandy beach. Cefn Sidan Sands is a whopping seven miles long, so it's safe to say that you won't be tripping over sandcastles and beach balls. Not that it isn't popular. It's part of Pembrey Country Park, an unusual mix of pine forest, grassland, family attractions and spectacular beach with all the space in the world. discovercarmarthenshire.com/parks ashburnhamgolfclub.co.uk

Southerndown Some things never go out of fashion

Game on

Golf Monthly magazine describes Southerndown Golf Course near Bridgend as 'a timeless classic'. Built around the natural contours of the land, its layout has remained largely unchanged since the 1920s. Why tamper with something that works so well? It's a full-blooded links course that also squeezes elements of parkland and clifftop into its rich and varied golfing bag. Originally conceived as a 7,170vard monster, it now stretches to a more manageable 6,428 vards. Size isn't everything - Southerndown remains a grittily challenging test of windswept links golf.

What's the story?

Despite feeling so organic that you could almost believe it grew naturally out of the ground, Southerndown bears the fingerprints of multiple course designers. Originally laid out in 1905 by Willie Fernie, it was tinkered with numerous times before the world-famous designer Harry Colt was enlisted just after World War One to make the notoriously difficult course a little more playable. He was clearly on the ball: Southerndown today is much as he left it.

Top hole

Watch out for the 166-yard, par-three fifth, a potential card-wrecker known as Carter's Folly. Aiming for a well-bunkered green, players must use enough club to clear a sheer-sided valley lying in wait to claim misplaced balls.

Après Southerndown. Now what?

You've probably heard of the Wales Coast Path. News of the world's first continuous coastal path went viral when it opened a few years back. It's 870 miles long and we reckon that 14 of those miles along the nearby Glamorgan Heritage Coast are some of its finest. We are the champions.

In 2014 we were proud to host The Senior Open Championship at Royal Porthcawl in South Wales – our very first Major – and look forward to welcoming it back in 2017. Here's what some of the players had to say about the tournament.

Bernhard Langer, Germany

Winner of the 2014 Senior Open Championship with 95 professional titles under his belt

On his 13-stroke victory.

We all have certain weeks and certain days when just everything goes great, we're in the zone and everything is wonderful and you can shoot course records and break other records. But to do it four days in a row and to lead from the front, to win it from the front is not easily done. I three-putted today from nowhere, and that was just a lapse of concentration. I was thinking about all sorts of garbage because I had a 13-shot lead and it didn't really matter. So it's not easy.

On the course.

The thing I enjoy the most is the firm ground. You can nip the ball and it just makes a certain sound when you hit it, and you can create some spin. Around the green you have so many options; you can putt the ball and use a four-iron, a seven-iron or a lob-wedge. You just need imagination to see the ball, which way you want to play it. There are a lot of options. Some courses when we have six inches of rough, there's no option. You just take your sand wedge and whack it out of there. That's all you can do. But here, you can almost use any club in the bag and that makes it fun.

On Royal Porthcawl's hopes of hosting The Open.

The course is definitely good for an Open Championship. I think it's a great test, especially when the wind blows a little bit.

Tom Watson, USA

Eight-time Open winner and captain of the 2014 US Ryder Cup team

On his journey through Wales.

I drove down through the centre of Wales on the A483 with Neil Oxman, my caddie. It was the plan to come down that way because I was told by one of the drivers at the Open, 'You must come down through Newtown and see the countryside.' And it's beautiful. I love the country; I live on a farm, and to see the hills and spectacular glens, it really was beautiful.

On the course.

Not knowing anything about it, from the first hole on, it was just one good hole after another. It was, well, this really is a good hole, good hole, great hole, great hole, great green complex. I really fell in love with it immediately. It's a great test of golf. Every hole was good. There's not a weak hole on the entire golf course. It just plays - every hole has got its character to it. You have to hit shots. You have to control your golf ball. It sets up visually.

Ian Woosnam, Wales

The first Welshman to win a Major and a Ryder Cup winner both as player and captain

On the challenges of Royal Porthcawl. Sometimes when you play this course, you get battered and you feel like you don't enjoy it. But when you get to see the views as it was on the golf course, how it was set up, I think that changes your mind a lot. We all know it's a great golf course but it's pleasing to hear someone like Tom Watson say how good the golf is.











Colin Montgomerie, Scotland Captain of The 2010 Ryder Cup Team Europe and Senior Tour newcomer

On the course and playing in Wales. This is the first time I've been west of Cardiff anywhere ever in my life and it's a delight. The weather is great. The golf course is in great condition, super test of golf, and everyone is excited by this championship here this year. I think this is the first of many, hopefully, that we play here in Wales, and we all look forward to it.

Miguel Ángel Jiménez, Spain Senior Tour newcomer and one of the heroes of The 2010 Ryder Cup

On returning to Wales.

I won here at The Wales Open in 2005, first time I played in Wales, and it was nice to win the tournament. I played in The Ryder Cup on The Twenty Ten at Celtic Manor, a good experience always. It's very nice every time I come here. Also in Caerleon, you have two Spanish restaurants.

Fred Couples, USA

Former Senior Open Champion with more than 60 professional wins to his name

On the power of Royal Porthcawl. I can't tell you, such a great golf course. Happy to be here. What makes these courses hard is that if tomorrow the wind blows another way, you're playing a completely different golf course. You can still shoot good scores here because it's in perfect shape. You could have a British Open here next week easily.

Honour roll

We've got superstars of our own. Here are a few Welsh golfing greats – past, present and future

Dai Rees

After cutting his golfing teeth at Aberdare in South Wales, Rees went on to become one of the most successful players of his generation. His extensive list of achievements included captaining the British Ryder Cup team on five occasions, including a memorable victory in 1957.

Brian Huggett

Beginning his golfing career at Neath, Huggett won 16 European Tour titles and a further ten on the Senior European Tour. He also featured in The Ryder Cup team on six occasions and served as captain in 1977. In 1973 at Muirfield, Huggett pulled off a major Ryder Cup achievement by being the only player on either team to go unbeaten.

Ian Woosnam

This farmer's son started out playing at Llanymynech in Mid Wales before going on to win more than 50 professional titles. Part of the 'Big Five' who dominated the game during the 80s and 90s - along with Ballesteros, Faldo, Langer and Lyle - 'Woosie' is a living golfing legend.

Jamie Donaldson

Pontypridd-born Donaldson turned professional in 2000. Seven professional wins later, he's a regular fixture on the European Tour. He etched his name into the annals of golf at The 2014 Ryder Cup, when his fantastic wedge shot to the 15th green secured victory for Europe.

Amy Boulden

At just 23 years old, Llandudno native Boulden is already making waves in international golf. Part of the victorious 2012 Great Britain and Ireland Curtis Cup team, she's won Opens in Wales and Scotland and qualified for the 2014 US Women's Open.













Treasure hunt.

Sometimes it's good to get off the beaten track. Wales is full of hidden golfing gems just waiting to be discovered. Here are a few of them.

Abersoch-

The perfect blend.

Nestled behind ancient sand dunes on the Llŷn Peninsula in North Wales, Abersoch is one of Welsh golf's bestkept secrets. Though it weighs in at a comparatively small 5,719 yards, it offers a giant-sized experience packed with golfing variety. A combination of links and parkland holes, Abersoch began life in 1908 as a Harry Vardon-designed nine-hole course. It was extended to a full 18 in the 1990s by Martin Hawtree, known for work on courses like Royal Birkdale, Sunningdale and Hoylake. The opening 12 holes at Abersoch are a masterclass in coastal links - fast running, dune-studded and windswept. Watch out for the par-four 11th, a testing hole played into the wind with a green encircled by bunkers. At the 13th, things take a turn towards parkland before the links re-emerge on the final hole, a 144-yard par-three back towards the clubhouse with out-of-bounds stringing the left hand side.

Borth & Ynyslas—

Hinterland golf at vintage coastal links.

The hit noir detective series. Hinterland. threw light on Cardigan Bay, a littlevisited part of Wales. It's time for you to investigate Borth & Ynyslas. Reputedly established in 1885, it claims to be the oldest club in Wales. While members of Tenby (est. 1888) might disagree, there is no argument about the quality of golf here. Laid out along the blue sweep of the bay, it's a links course in the classic mould – a proper out-and-back configuration sandwiched between the sea and the coast road. Don't expect an easy ride. The rugged terrain is challenge enough, but factor in the everpresent seaside breeze and you've got a course that will test even the most able golfer. The par-four second demands an accurate drive to a narrow fairway and angled green well protected by bunkers. There's more room to manoeuvre at the 18th, but you still have to contend with no less than five bunkers guarding the green. Making it round with a decent score is no mean achievement. borthgolf.co.uk

The Rolls of Monmouth— A real high roller.

Stumbling across The Rolls of Monmouth for the first time can be a discombobulating experience. How could such a spectacular course lie almost unnoticed in the lush green landscape of South Wales? Laid out around historic Hendre House - now the clubhouse - this is parkland golf at its refined best. Greg Norman was the Touring Professional here in the 1980s. Snaking through mature woodland and dotted with lakes, highlights abound. The par-five seventh invites a big tee shot to an undulating fairway, while the two-tiered green at the eighth requires careful club selection if you're to avoid the yawning bunker lurking to its left. What's in a name? A lot actually. Between 1767 and 1987, Hendre Hall was the home of the Rolls family, including one Charles Stuart Rolls. He teamed up with Frederick Royce to form the Rolls-Royce motor company, the last word in automotive luxury. Hardly surprising then that The Rolls of Monmouth is such a classy golfing experience.



Neath-

A hilltop hideaway.

Neath's location - high on a hill overlooking the Dulais Valley - is the perfect spot for a golf course. But don't take our word for it. Neath's designer. legendary course architect and fivetime Open winner James Braid, was of a similar opinion. 'The situation is superb for the playing of golf,' was his assessment on visiting the site for the first time. It's easy to see why he was so impressed. Strewn with organic features and undulations. Neath's heathland terrain is the perfect fit for Braid's naturalistic design style. The signature 15th hole - known as The Pulpit - makes use of an 80ft drop between tee and green, demanding an exhilarating drive into the open sky. We'll leave the final word to another Neath fan, threetime Open winner Henry Cotton: 'I've travelled the entire golfing world, but never before seen such golfing beauty as at Neath.' The hunt continues...

Aberystwyth-

With picture-perfect views taking in Snowdonia, the Llŷn Peninsula and the Preseli Mountains in Pembrokeshire. Aberystwyth is quite a looker. Soak up the sights at the elevated seventh tee, but keep an eye on your swing bunkers, grassy hollows, ponds and ditches await any misplaced shots. aberystwythgolfclub.com

Clyne—

While it isn't as well known as nearby Pennard, Clyne's lofty coastal setting is just as spectacular. With well-protected greens and gorse-lined fairways, it's a proper test of golf. You'll need every club in your bag as you face tight par-threes and big, booming par-fives. clynegolfclub.com

Criccieth—

Big isn't always best. Measuring just 5,034 yards, par-67 Criccieth proves that size isn't everything. It more than makes up for it with breathtaking views of the Cambrian Coast and a series of quirkily challenging holes. See the 18th, a parthree measuring just 100 yards, but with a drop of 100ft between tee and green. cricciethgolfclub-northwales.co.uk

Morlais Castle—

Follow the signs to the Brecon Mountain Railway from Merthyr Tydfil, take a ride on the narrow-gauge train into the Brecon Beacons, then play Morlais Castle. It's unpretentious and unassuming, where you'll enjoy engaging moorland golf (and great vistas) whether your handicap is three or 30. morlaisgolf.com



Not just for the boys.

She's a model, racing driver, polo player and TV presenter, but Jodie Kidd also lists golf as one of her abiding passions. Wales Golf editor Huw Thomas chats with her at The Celtic Manor Resort, Newport, to hear about her life on the course.

How did you get started playing golf?

It wasn't the most auspicious of beginnings. When I was 11 we were spending Christmas at our family home in Barbados. I remember that I was annoying my dad so much because I desperately wanted a particular yellow waterproof Walkman, but on Christmas Day he told my brother, sister and me our present was to have a golf lesson. I was livid. We went to the lesson, all of us absolutely furious. We couldn't believe it as we had a list of all these wonderful gadgets that we had wanted and now we were being forced to play golf. Jack and Jemma hated it, but I fell in love with it immediately.

After that I played a lot for four years until I started modelling. I took it up again when I was about 21 and played really solidly for a long time. I got my handicap down to about 15 and participated in the Dunhill Links and

other Pro Am competitions all around the world. I was very dedicated and playing golf all the time. I let it slip for a while as I was doing other things like racing and TV, so golf got put on the back burner a bit. But golf is one of those sports that – as long as you don't expect too much - you can go out after a long break and get around the course. You don't expect to play off your handicap but you can still enjoy it. I haven't played a huge amount recently because I've been filming, but having the lesson here was a great way to ease back into it.

Can you tell us about your relationship with Celtic Manor Resort?

So much of my golfing history happened here. I played in two All Star Cups here, where we played The Ryder Cup format and I played in the Celebrity Cup more recently. I also held fundraising golf events for my Foundation here a couple of times, so I know these courses very

well. Celtic Manor and I are very close. And I was here for The Ryder Cup in 2010. Every time I come here I have the most wonderful time. The hospitality is amazing. I love Celtic Manor because I've gone through some enormous events here – with thousands of spectators plus a live TV audience. I'm an amateur golfer but I love to put myself into very scary situations like that. After going through these huge events you really bond with a place so I absolutely love it here. It's brilliant.

The Twenty Ten is a really tricky course, and you've also got the Montgomerie and Roman Road. That's why I'm such a big fan. You've got slightly easier courses, slightly tougher courses. There's something here for everyone and the Golf Academy is fabulous. We've already been up to the range because David needed some lessons and I needed a refresher.

You're also right on the edge of everything else Wales has to offer. You could have a day at the coast and a day travelling inland to the Brecon Beacons.

Is playing in big events a nervewracking experience?

Golf can often go really wrong and it has done a few times when I've been taking part in events. I remember one of the All Star Cups where we had Catherine Zeta-Jones and Michael Douglas here representing Europe and the USA. We had something like 25,000 people around the course, so teeing off at the first was like the final hole at Augusta. The whole fairway was lined ten deep. So of course I shanked it straight into the crowd. Once you've done that on live TV it can't really get any worse, so you tend to relax a bit.

What is it that keeps bringing you back to Celtic Manor Resort?

If you're going just for a golfing holiday, the hotel has to be good. That's why it's so wonderful here, because you've got the spa, which is really nice after you've been out on the course. It's been a while since I played, so it was good to have a little massage afterwards. The facilities have to be attractive and then 90 percent of it has to be the golf courses themselves. It's absolutely stunning here when you drop down into the valley towards the river. It's spectacular, the holes are beautiful, the







courses are immaculately kept and the greens are all wickedly fast.

You're also right on the edge of everything else Wales has to offer. You could have a day at the coast and a day travelling inland to the Brecon Beacons. It's very well situated. You just travel down the M4 and you've got a Ryder Cup course. I was in Gleneagles for The 2014 Ryder Cup and that's certainly not as easy to reach.

How well do you know Wales?

I was recently at Portmeirion for a new classic car show I'm filming, so I was driving a £15 million Ferrari around the narrow little streets. What a mad place! It's just something that you don't expect at all. Absolutely stunning. After that I took the car up to the foothills of Snowdon and found some fabulous driving roads. I'd never really ventured to that area before. I'd really love to explore more because it's such a beautiful place.

Has your work allowed you to play golf in many other places?

I've played all over the world. When I was in my mid-20s and really getting back into golf, I made a pact with myself that I'd play a golf course everywhere I went. I'd take an afternoon off and find somewhere to play. I've played all through Australia, South America, South Africa, the Caribbean, all over really. When you're travelling and tired from working hard, it's nice to get out on the golf course, get your feet back down on the ground and have some refreshing exercise. It's fun to play with other people, but I also loved getting away from everything and playing on my own. Thanks to the places my work takes me I'm able to play in some really gorgeous settings.

How does Celtic Manor Resort compare to some of the places you've played on your travels?

It's right up there. They wouldn't have had The Ryder Cup here if not. The Twenty Ten is fabulous. It's tricky, it's long and testing but it can be more forgiving for an amateur golfer. You may not get the best score, but you can still have fun. This is the first time I've played The Twenty Ten since The Ryder Cup was staged here, so it's great to be back.

It takes two.

David Blakely takes his first steps towards becoming a playing partner.

I'm an absolute golfing beginner, but Jodie plays a lot so I really want to get into it. We came to Celtic Manor a little while ago and Jodie showed me the course. but it wasn't until this time that we tried an intensive golf lesson. Our session went really well and our coach Alex was absolutely brilliant. With both Jodie and Alex coaching me I picked up some really good tips and felt like I progressed really quickly. We had our swings filmed so we could see exactly what we were doing - both right and wrong - and there was video footage of Martin Kaymer that you could compare yourself with. It was incredibly helpful to see exactly how the pros do it.

The best thing about being a golf novice here is that once you can hit the ball in a straight line you can have a go on a world-class course. We're going to see the same coach again before we leave and hopefully get out for a proper game. celtic-manor.com

What Jodie did next.

Shortly after our chat, Jodie and David traded Celtic Manor for another Welsh heavyweight. They walked the famous 'Fan Dance' route, based on an SAS test and training march, to the summit of Pen y Fan, at 886m (2,907ft) the highest peak in the Brecon Beacons. Looks like they enjoyed the experience.

Susie Waldock

Following her dad onto the course at the age of eight, 38-year-old Susie's association with Aberdovey continues to this day. She now runs the club's golf shop and gets out onto the course as often as work and family commitments allow. With both her father and son being regulars on Aberdovey's links, there's hope that those family commitments will dovetail with golf more frequently as time goes by.

Oli Waldock

Though aged just eight, Oli is no stranger to the golf course. He's already been playing for about three years and his interest in the game is growing by the day. A recent trip to The Open at Hoylake gave him the opportunity to see some star players up close and even grab a few autographs. He's not the only junior member of the Waldock family to be bitten by the golfing bug younger sister Abby is also a member of Aberdovey's youth programme.

Paul Bloxidge

A member of Aberdovey for more than 30 years, 66-year-old Paul is a committed ambassador for the club and a big part of its efforts to encourage younger players. Golf here has always been a family affair for Paul - his wife Judy is also a long-time member and his children James and Susie have both played since an early age. With grandson Oli now getting into the game, it looks like golf is a tradition that's set to continue.



The generation game.

Golf in Wales is a game for everyone. Young or old, low handicapper or enthusiastic amateur, you'll find a warm welcome on our greens and fairways. Wales Golf editor **Huw Thomas** accompanied three generations of the same family to Aberdovey on the Mid Wales coast for an inclusive all-ages round.

It's a blustery day when we arrive at Aberdovey to meet our trio of golfers. Set on dune-studded coastal land at the edge of blue Cardigan Bay, brisk sea breezes are an ever-present feature here, but today's winds are particularly vigorous. They are also blowing in an unusual direction, promising to make an already challenging course that little bit trickier. As we make our way from the golf shop to the first tee, Paul warns us not to expect a particularly low-scoring round.

Not that today is necessarily about carding the best score. We're here to experience another flavour of Welsh 'golf as it should be' - a fun, friendly

game accessible to all the family, whether they've been playing for three or 30-plus years.

That's good news for Oli. Today he's wearing a cap decorated with the autographs of a number of top players - a memento of that recent trip to The Open at Hoylake - and it's clear that he's already well on his way to becoming a seasoned player. As a junior member at Aberdovey, he takes part in regular coaching sessions and tournaments, but also spends a lot of time simply enjoying the game. 'I like taking part in the competitions, but it's fun just to come out and play,' he says. 'Quite a lot of my friends play here too.'

'Oli's been playing for about three years,' Susie adds. 'He's always enjoyed it, but recently he's started to get really enthusiastic. It's a very welcoming club for younger players.'

It certainly is. In addition to the back 'Darwin' tees, Aberdovey's blue tees offer a more achievable option for younger golfers who aren't yet able to hit the biggest drives. But it isn't just the junior members who benefit from this flexibility. 'We have a lot of older members here too,' Paul tells us, 'Having a slightly less demanding option is good for golfers who aren't physically up to a full 18 holes but aren't ready to hang up their clubs just yet.'

Keeping it in the family

'There are a large number of families who have been members here for generations,' says Paul. 'A lot of them are away members who have holiday homes here and have been coming for years.'

The club's traditions provide ample evidence that golf in Aberdovey has long been a game for the whole family. The Colonel Lee, an annual competition pairing golfers aged 12 and under with an older relative, has been running here for almost a century. 'We've got certain younger members who are single-figure golfers, so we get some very good scores,' says Susie. 'My Mum and my brother James won it some years ago, but the best Dad and I have managed is second place."

'Starting around 2011, we made a big push to get local juniors here playing golf,' says Paul, 'It has been hugely successful. Whereas it used to be that we had 20 local juniors and maybe 80 that didn't live locally, it's now almost exactly the other way around. We run

programmes with local schools and we have about 40 young players who come here regularly on a Tuesday night.'

Doing the rounds

As we work our way around the course, talk turns to favourite holes. Aberdovey's raw and rugged links throw up plenty of contenders, but it's clear that here are a few standouts for our party. 'The 16th is my favourite hole,' says Oli. 'It's really fun to play.' Mum Susie agrees: 'The 16th can be particularly nerve-wracking when you know you've got a good card in your hand."

It's not long before we get a demonstration of how the hole can catch out unsuspecting players. The wind snatches Paul's drive from the slightly raised tee box, sending his shot over the fence and towards the train tracks that run along the course's edge. This is a section of out-of-bounds that claims many a lost ball.

Perhaps unsurprisingly, Paul has a different view on Aberdovey's highlights. 'The best hole on the course is the

11th.' he reckons. 'It's a wonderful hole. really tough. And the 18th is the best finishing hole in Wales.' It's a bold claim, but as we make our way to the final flag you can understand Paul's enthusiasm. A long, straight par-four to a green lying just feet from the clubhouse, it requires some confident driving - plus a cool head to sink your putt under the watchful eyes of the members. If anybody is feeling nervous, they don't show it. While a loose record of the scores has been kept around the course, this is a game where everyone's a winner. The joy of golf is its own reward, so nobody is under too much pressure to make par. Final putts holed, everyone troops off to enjoy some well-deserved refreshments and to reflect on another successful round at family-friendly Aberdovey. It's the end of the latest chapter in a golfing story that spans generations. And, at a club that prides itself on embracing all age groups, it doesn't look like a tale that will finish any time soon.









Making tracks:

In addition to swallowing many wayward shots, the railway line bounding Aberdovey's eastern edge allows adventurous players to attempt a truly unique 18 holes of golf.

Play nine at Aberdovey before catching the train just outside the clubhouse and riding the rails north to complete your round at the mighty links of Royal St David's in Harlech. It will take a little longer than the average game, but with two world-class courses – plus a breathtaking ride through miles of spectacular Mid Wales coast and countryside – we think it's worth it.



Natural selection.



Darwin is a name that crops up a lot here. The legendary godfather of sports writers Bernard Darwin is famously associated with Aberdovey, memorably describing it as the place his 'soul loved best of all the courses in the world.'

Aged just six or so years old, Darwin witnessed Aberdovey's birth in the 1880s when, in an effort to stave off winter boredom, Darwin's uncle Arthur Ruck sank nine flowerpots into the turf to create his own rudimentary golf course. It was this roughand-ready collection of holes – played by just a handful of friends and relatives – that imbued the young Darwin with a lifetime of love for the game. It's a romantic story that's echoed in modern-day Aberdovey's continuing efforts to inspire the players of tomorrow.



The finer things in golf.

How easy is it to combine first-class golf with the last word in luxury accommodation? We sent Golf World Senior Editor Kit Alexander and nonplaying friend Becky on an indulgent Mid Wales break to find out.

For most players, the perfect weekend away involves as much golf as ossible on courses that look good, are interestingly laid out and well maintained. Your significant other, however, usually has different ideas. In my case, she wanted two days of five-star luxury, pampering and relaxation in extravagant surroundings that would make her friends sick with jealousy. The two very rarely go hand-in-hand - and a compromise often ends up satisfying neither party.

But as we walk into Lake Country House and Spa - an opulent gem in the heart of green Mid Wales - I'm confident I've found the Holy Grail of weekends away. You can feel the history and extravagance the moment you walk in. The walls are covered with classical paintings, every room is furnished in the most luxurious and decadent manner possible and there is a calming ambience throughout. It's like relaxing in an episode of the Antiques Roadshow.

Once we've checked into our spacious suite overlooking the hotel's grounds we go and investigate the spa. It's a supremely inviting facility and - with Becky surrounded by bubbles and oils for the afternoon - I can head for my first tee time at Cradoc Golf Club over the hill near Brecon safe in the knowledge that she'll be in an excellent mood when I return.

Teeing off

After a Welsh welcome from head pro and my playing partner for the afternoon, Richard Davies, it's straight to the first tee. With mature trees flanking the fairway, I'm relieved to see my opening drive fly straight down the middle. It's mid-September and as I comment on the perfect firmness

of the greens after seeing my wedge approach release a little past the hole, Richard tells me they've had another glorious summer that has allowed the greenkeeping staff to get the 6,188-yard, par-71 course into peak condition.

The next six holes continue the parkland fun as you gradually climb up the hillside. By the time you reach the green of the par-three seventh, you've climbed high above the clubhouse without even realising. This slight surprise at our altitude made the breathtaking views out across the rolling Brecon Beacons even more captivating.

The back nine continues the theme of clever parkland holes with stunning views. The downhill par-three 12th and the 14th, a reachable par-five if you take on the cross bunkers off the tee, are

particularly good holes before the long par-three 17th and 393-yard 18th holes take you back to the clubhouse.

Catching up with Becky after my game, I have a little more time to appreciate the surroundings. Our spacious suite sits at the end of the hotel, overlooking the croquet lawn and beautiful woods. The champagne on our arrival certainly helps us ease our way blissfully into a laid-back, romantic evening.

The high life

The previous night's relaxation is greatly appreciated as I rise early for my round at Llandrindod Wells Golf Club. The clubhouse is perched near the summit of one of the largest hills in the area and from the moment you hit your opening tee shot straight up an extremely steep fairway, it's obvious this is a very different course to Cradoc.

Llandrindod Wells - I'm relieved my local playing partner's pronunciation is the far more manageable 'Llandod' - was designed by six-time Open Champion Harry Vardon in 1905 and altered some years later by James Braid, and the links influences are clear to see. The fairways are firm and fast and wind is a constant factor, with very few trees to protect you.

I'm playing with John Stevenson, a club member and director of Heart of Wales Golf Breaks. The group – which offers green fee and accommodation packages for all three clubs I'm visiting on this trip - is approaching its 10th anniversary and is an excellent starting point for anyone interested in playing golf in this part of Wales. John's local knowledge comes in very handy, as there are quite a few blind shots. Knowing where to land the ball on the fairways and greens is essential. Links purists will love the challenge this course poses - not to mention the creative shot-making required to get the ball round in a decent number.

It's a relatively short 5,759-yard par-69, but don't let that fool you - it's tough. The 374-yard par-four 12th was a particular highlight. The tee is the highest point on the course (and for as far as the eye can see) and you smash a drive off into the abyss of a steeply downhill fairway.

Down in the valley

It's a short 20-minute drive to my final round. Unlike its more mountainous peers, Builth Wells lies entirely on a valley floor. A tributary of the River Irfon winds through the course, coming into play on five holes. Originally opened as a nine-holer in 1923, it was extended to the full 18 in 1986. My playing partner, Colin Bradley, has been a member for 60 years and actually helped to reroute the extended course and build some of the new greens.

The flatter, tree-lined terrain makes Builth Wells a bit of an easier walk. It's also the shortest of the three layouts - a par-66 of 5,420 yards off the back tees. The first three holes offer a relatively gentle start to ease yourself into the

round before the first real tests come on the fourth and sixth holes, two of four par-fours that measure over 400 yards, and the whopping 242-yard par-three seventh.

But the fun really begins when the river comes into play on the back nine and you face some great risk-and-reward holes. You drive over the river twice with one shot as it snakes across the 10th fairway, the 12th is a reachable par-four and the 450-yard par-four 13th sees you drive over a hill before hitting into a green far below you. The final three holes offer great scoring opportunities with a short par-four played back over the river, followed by a 177-yard par-three and a strong par-four to complete my magnificent 54 holes in Mid Wales.

Actually, that should be 63 holes. I didn't have the opportunity on this trip, but next time I come I'll also try the Lake's very own nine-hole par-three golf course (they even provide the clubs).

A taste of luxury

While Becky and I were doing our own thing in the spa and on the golf course for a few hours each day, there were still plenty of ways to share enjoyment. The house and spa are set in spectacular grounds and we took a different walk every day. The path around the main lake was our favourite route – we could have sat watching a pair of swans and their eight cygnets for hours.

In the evening, the award-winning restaurant offers modern Celtic cuisine served in a stately dining room. Chef Darren Tattersall sources the finest local ingredients to create innovative dishes that you can't resist taking a picture of – and they taste even better than they look. And there are more than 300 wines on offer to help wash them down.

I even got the chance to enjoy the spa with Becky before we checked out on our final morning. I may be a golfer first and foremost, but I'm not ashamed to say I'm rather partial to a cleansing stint in the steam room, an invigorating dip in a hot tub and a swim in the pool (a proper sized one in the Lake's case, not the usual tiny apology).

Our weekend in Mid Wales ticked every box for us. My golfing demands were thoroughly satisfied at three very different courses, Becky enjoyed some world-class R&R in a sumptuous spa and we both sampled some of the finest cuisine in Britain in surroundings that were as extravagant as they were welcoming.

It just goes to show that a couples' getaway doesn't have to be about compromise. We both got exactly what we wanted. Go on, treat yourself (and the other half) to the finer things in golf. You deserve it.



Spa quality at The Lake

It's facials rather than fairways for **Becky**, as she immerses herself in the Lake's luxurious spa.

After checking in, the first thing on my list was to go and check out the spa and gym facilities. The spa isn't visible from the hotel but a short walk through the lovely grounds leads you to its location on the edge of a lake. A quick tour reveals a coffee shop, 50ft swimming pool, sauna, steam room, gym and outdoor hot tub overlooking the water.

I opted for the 60-minute Repose aromatherapy facial which is suitable for all skin types – ideal for my sensitive skin. It promises to soothe, calm and nourish a tired, irritated or unhappy complexion and uses products from the Temple Spa range. I also added a foot massage to my treatment, the ideal ending to ensure my stress levels returned to a more acceptable level. Needless to say, I didn't want the treatment to end, so it was music to my ears when my talented therapist, Carol, said that I could take as much time as I wanted to lie there, calm and contented, once she'd finished.

Different strokes.

What's your perfect golfing experience? Whether you're looking for a no-fuss nine or a challenging 18 holes, Wales has it covered. We sent keen golfers Andrew **Davies** and **Neil Skelton** to play two very different courses in Pembrokeshire – cosy St David's City and big-hitting Tenby. Here's their blow-by-blow account.





Vital statistics Name: Andrew Davies Handicap: 7

Golf experience: Andrew's playing career started at age six - though his parents say he was watching golf from three years old. Apart from a short hiatus in his late teens and early 20s, he's been playing ever since. A member of Monmouthshire Golf Club, South Wales, he recently achieved two major golfing ambitions - getting his handicap down to single figures and meeting his hero Fred Couples at the 2014 Senior Open Championship at Royal Porthcawl. Favourite course in Wales:

Championship Old Course. Marriott St Pierre

Favourite international course: Queenstown Golf Club. New Zealand Vital statistics Name: Neil Skelton Handicap: 8.6

Golf experience: Neil has been a regular on the golf course for as long as he can remember, walking round with his father before picking up some clubs himself. He had an early taste of success, becoming iunior champion at Monmouth Golf Club in the first ever competition he entered. He's played all over the country, but is now a member of Monmouthshire Golf Club near his hometown of Abergavenny, He's still in search of that elusive hole in one.

Favourite course in Wales:

Favourite international course:

Costa Adeje, Tenerife

Tenby A big name in links golf

First impressions?

Andrew: The approach to Tenby Golf Club was lovely. The course really looked the part. There was a welcoming clubhouse, driving range, a small pitch and putt and a practice green. The facilities were fantastic. The steward came over and had a chat with us, so it was a very friendly experience.

Neil: The setting is beautiful. You've got views of the brightly coloured houses of Tenby, you've got the beach and the sea. Even if you weren't playing golf, it's a great place to spend some time.

How was the course?

A: The course layout was absolutely fantastic. The holes were challenging and it was exactly what you'd expect from a proper links. If you want a test, that's what you'll get. Seeing as I'm not an experienced links player, I was surprised how well I played. On a parkland course, if you put your ball in the right place, it generally stays there, but on a links it tends to roll off and do all sorts of funny things. You need a bit of luck and I think we probably had that when we played. Phil Mickelson said it took him 20 years to learn how to play links, so maybe in 20 years I'll have got the hang of it. N: It wasn't quite as punishing off the fairways as I was expecting. I'd played the course previously and it wasn't as difficult as I remembered. I don't see how it really could have been any different, so maybe I just played better this time.





Best hole?

A: The ninth was stunning, a real signature hole. It's got everything that was attractive about the course. You're teeing off from high up with some amazing views over Tenby.

N: The ninth was definitely a highlight. Sometimes you have those holes where you're playing from a spectacular elevated position and the actual hole lets you down, but this was great all the way. The landing area was tight, you've got the beach to the right, with the wind pushing you left and your second shot

What sort of player would you recommend the course to?

has you playing blind to the green.

A: If you want a test, that's what you'll get. It's true links. You get some courses that call themselves links because the ball bounces and you've got gorse all over the place, but this is the real thing. Being more of a parkland golfer, it was probably the best round of links golf I've ever played. Things just seemed to work out for me, though I'd be surprised if I did as well next time.

N: If you're a serious golfer looking for a real challenge, it's the place to go. You need to be playing regularly because you could have a really nasty time if you aren't prepared. Links golf can be frustrating because the margins are so tight. I've never been as drawn to links as some people are, but our game at Tenby was really enjoyable. Maybe I'd feel differently if I hadn't played as well as I did, but it has made me want to try out some more links courses in Wales in the future.

First impressions?

A: It's quite low-key compared to some of the clubs I've been to – but everything was there. You go round into the locker room and there are clubs on the side for you to use if you haven't brought your own.

N: Paying your green fees in an honesty box was the thing that struck me. You wouldn't get that in the middle of Cardiff.

How was the course?

A: It's pretty much golf as it should be. There's nothing corporate. For £20 you can play all day. Or you can pay £65 and play for the whole week. If you were going on holiday with your family and staying at one of the local campsites it would be perfect.

N: It's just back to basics. It's simply: 'There's the course, now go and play it.' It was links golf at its best really. The tee boxes were rustic, but the fairways and greens were in excellent condition. As you drop down from the first hole you see the coastline and get some great views over Whitesands Bay.

A: It's not easy. You've got gorse bushes. The fairways are smooth and green, but if you're off you're in some pretty serious rough.


N: If you're a club golfer and you pay a membership, it's a totally different experience – in a good way. There's nothing there apart from the golf, so it's a very old-school experience. It strips everything away that can be a bit pompous about golf. It's not about having the best equipment and the shiniest facilities. You can just turn up and play golf in a lovely setting and have a great game. So – golf really as it should be.

Best hole?

A: The fourth is a great little par-three. The beach is right there and you can watch the surfers in the sea.

N: I don't think anyone could play the course and not agree that the fourth was their favourite hole.





What sort of player would you recommend the course to?

A: If you were going on a golfing tour it's not necessarily the first course that would spring to mind, but you should definitely add it to the list especially if you're a family of four or small group and you all play golf. None of the holes are too long for kids and any standard of golfer could go and have fun there. You've got St Davids on your doorstep, so if you want a drink or meal afterwards, you've got a huge choice of pubs and restaurants.

N: If we were staying in St Davids for the week we'd pay our £65 and be very happy to play there. If you had a kid who just wanted to swing a club, it's the perfect place. It's ideal for someone who wants to get their first taste of golf. It's not too long, which makes it great for younger golfers – or older players who want to take things easy.

Dream on.

1 - 4th Llanymynech

Enjoy a truly international golf experience. Here at Ian Woosnam's old stomping ground, you tee off in Wales and sink your putt over the border in England. It's all thanks to Llanymynech's position astride Offa's Dyke, the 8th-century earthwork that once separated the two countries. Don't worry, you won't need vour passport.

2 - 18th Pyle & Kenfig

You'll need to take a leap of faith here. A blind tee shot over grasping gorse will get you to the fairway, but you'll still have to penetrate a green protected on three sides by banks and bunkers.

4 - 16th Ashburnham

The hole is all about picking the right club – usually one more than seems necessary at first glance. Be sure to carry the bunkers, but watch out for some perilous rough lying in wait at the back of the green.

Located on the pristine Llŷn Peninsula, this long downhill par-three features views that are out of this world. As you line up your shot, gaze across the bay towards the misty mountains of Snowdonia for more dreamy experiences. It's an unreal vista straight out of *Lord of* the Rings.

Long and straight, this may seem straightforward at first glance. But with out of bounds to the right and the sea to your left, a misplaced drive will serve as a severe wake up call.

Don't wake in a cold sweat. With water on both sides, this is a hole where you'll want to avoid making a splash. Though it's comparatively short, a misplaced tee shot will consign your ball to a watery grave. rhosgolf.co.uk

8 - 18th Mountain Ash

Dreams can become nightmares on this intimidating hole, with a big drive required to reach the distant fairway. Do it right and you can make the green in two, but beware the out-of-bounds lurking menacingly close to your target. mountainashgc.co.uk


9 - 7th Pennard

Played downhill towards the sea between the remains of a 13th-century church and a ruined castle perched high on a cliff, there's plenty to distract you here. No time for daydreaming though – you'll need all your skill to hold the plateau green that runs away from you. pennardgolfclub.com

Swede dreams are made of this.

We've always known that Wales is a top golfing destination, but what's the international perspective? We caught up with a group of Swedish golfers on their first Welsh tour to see what they thought.

Since 1996, a group of golfing friends who call themselves 'GolfPoolarna' (loosely translated as 'golf buddies') have been travelling the world to indulge their playing passion. Over the years, they've been to Northern Ireland, Scotland, Spain, Turkey, Singapore and even the Dominican Republic to play an annual three-round competition called 'The Trip' on the best courses they can find. In 2014, it was Wales's turn, with links golf at Porthmadog, Royal St David's and Nefyn & District on the menu. Here's how they got on.

Bertil Jonason-

Age: 66 | Handicap: 10.5

My expectations of Wales were pretty high as I'd been told about it by golf friends who had been there before. It all started very well, with the trip from Manchester Airport going very

smoothly. In a little under two hours we were at Porthmadog Golf Club. We had a guick lunch and then played 18 holes in the afternoon. It was lovely to experience so much during the first day of our trip.

The courses were fantastic, especially Royal St David's and Nefyn & District. Those are two of the best courses I have ever played and I've played in many places around the world. I'd love to play them again when I return to Wales.

We were made to feel very welcome throughout our visit. Criccieth was a lovely seaside village and the hotel had some fantastic views out over the bay. The golf clubs were all very friendly too. Wales was one of the best experiences I've ever had and I'm going to be recommending it to other golfers. I will definitely be back and I'll probably bring some friends with me next time I come.

Klas Hammar—

Age: 67 | Handicap: 22

We have travelled all over the British Isles, but this was the first time this group had been to Wales. We've been playing together for nearly 20 years, so we decided we wanted to try something new.

I'd heard a bit about Wales as my wife has been here a couple of times. We were very excited about the golf courses. We are a group of well-travelled people and when we come away on these trips we like to play links courses. We don't have that many of them in Sweden and inland courses can be very wet when we travel in October.

The best experience for me was to play at Nefyn. I thought it was similar to the famous Pebble Beach in California. I really enjoyed the course, the surroundings, the layout, the conditions For what we received the price was very competitive. We were able to take advantage of a winter green fee rate, so we got a lot of golf for our money.

Anders Sjögren-

I come.

Age: 68 | Handicap: 13

I won the Order of Merit on last year's trip, so it was up to me to arrange the next trip. I came to Wales during the 2010 Ryder Cup at Celtic Manor Resort and I'd heard a lot about Nefyn & District. My son also played there a couple of years ago so I'd heard good things about it. Last year we played in Spain because it was a bad summer in Sweden and we needed some sun. The year before we played at Machrihanish in Scotland, so we decided to go a bit further south and give Wales a go. We had lots of help to get everything organised from lan and Mark at Wales Golf Holidays.

A lot of us who hadn't been here before were pleasantly surprised by how good the golf was in Wales. I think we were all impressed by the quality of the courses. If you compare the courses with those in Scotland they stand up very well.

I liked Royal St David's a lot. We've played links all over the British Isles, and Royal St David's was very good. Everyone was really impressed. I've got so much credit for arranging this trip.







Nefyn was excellent. All of the guys want to go back to Wales and we'll definitely plan to play there again. The peninsular section of the course was closed due to repair work, but the New Course was wonderful.

I enjoyed Porthmadog too. It was a little different because it was a mix of parkland and links holes, but I liked that. It's a good course to start with, particularly for people who might not have played for a little while. Going straight onto a pure links course could be quite a challenge, so having some parkland holes was actually helpful.

The trip as a whole was great. We had excellent service and a wonderful hotel that we thought should be four stars rather than three. The staff were very helpful and took care of us really well. The clubs were thoroughly welcoming too. People would come up to us to say hello and talk about where we'd come from and give us tips about the courses.

In fact, the only downside was that I didn't do so well in the competition this time round.

Jan von Baumgarten-Stahlberg-

Age: 66 | Handicap: 20

It was my first time in Wales, but I had heard a lot of good things about it. We have played in Ireland, Northern Ireland and Scotland so many times. I was maybe not surprised, but I was delighted by the courses in Wales.

Royal St David's was a magnificent course with a fantastic links style through all 18 holes. I really enjoyed the course, though it was rather difficult. My score wasn't the best, but I did better at Nefyn & District. Nefyn was magnificent, because you are very exposed to the sea, the wind and every element of nature's power. When we played the wind was between 15 and 25 knots so it was rather brisk.

The Old Course out on the peninsula was shut to repair some storm damage, but after our game we were able to play four of the holes and of course, after the 15th hole, we went down to the pub on the beach. It's obligatory when you play there. It was very sheltered and such a beautiful spot, so we had a pint and went back up to play the other two holes. It was a really unusual experience.

My favourite course was Nefyn, because that's where I played the best golf. It also showed a lot of the specific characteristics of a seaside links course. There was wind but the weather was good and I was able to play low shots. I played the full 18 holes with the same ball, which is quite an achievement on a course like that.

We stayed at The Caerwylan in Criccieth

which was a very good seaside hotel. We have stayed in some really bad hotels on our other trips, but this was excellent. It's not so much about luxury, but the welcome and the feel of local character that I look for. We definitely got that in Criccieth. It was lovely little village, nice pubs and restaurants, there was also a nice restaurant at the hotel.

I would recommend Wales as a place to visit for a golf trip. It would definitely come out on my Top Ten list and I'm sure we'll come back to Wales in the future.

Not your average round then. Take a break from the golfing norm. A game in Wales doesn't just feature lush greens and fab fairways. You'll also encounter Roman remains, monster drives, diving dolphins and Ice Age relics. Here are just a few unique experiences to watch out for.

It's Heaven and Hell out there

Played into the prevailing wind, it's easy to see why North Wales Golf Club's devilishly tricky 13th hole was dubbed 'Hades' by founder, Manchester businessman Tancred B Cummins (yes, that really was his name). Despite calls from local Church Commissioners to change it to something less blasphemous, Cummins stuck to his guns – naming the Llandudno course's parfour 18th 'Paradise' as a concession. northwalesgolfclub.org.uk

Up in the air

Links don't have to be beside the seaside. At the 'upland links' of Harry Vardon-designed Llandrindod Wells, traditional coastal features – such as natural hazards and firm, quick-draining turf – sit high on a hill with not a seagull in sight. Instead keep your eyes peeled for the forked tails of red kites, Mid Wales's iconic bird of prey.

Life's a beach

Take a break from your round at Nefyn & District on the Llŷn Peninsula with a quick drink at the historic Tŷ Coch Inn, conveniently located between the 15th and 16th holes on the dramatic peninsular section of the course. Set just yards from the golden sands of Porthdinllaen, it's been voted one of the world's best beach bars. The entire village is owned by the National Trust. It's the kind of place you just you won't want to leave – so try not to forget those last three holes.

Play the long game

Weighing in at a hefty 7,433 yards, Vale Resort's Wales National course is one of the longest outside the USA. Its massive second hole is on a similarly epic scale. Measuring a whopping 607 yards from the back tee, it's one of the longest par-fives in Wales and a real challenge for anyone who fancies themselves a big hitter. Don't forget to pack your driver when playing this challenging Vale of Glamorgan course.

Rock star

Welsh Ryder Cup heros Phillip Price and Jamie Donaldson both cut their golfing teeth on the tree-lined fairways of Pontypridd, but they're not the only heavyweights to call this place home. A short distance from the golf club lies Y Garreg Siglo, otherwise known as the Rocking Stone. Deposited here by glaciers during the last Ice Age, this massive boulder has long exerted a mystical pull – in 1795 it was the central point of the Gorsedd, a ceremonial gathering of the bards.

The sky's the limit

Your eyes aren't deceiving you. Even though Pennard's undulating hummocks, hillocks and dunes bear all the hallmarks of a classic coastal links course, it actually sits 200ft above sea level. No wonder it's known as the 'links in the sky'. Pennard's lofty position comes with certain advantages, notably some towering views over sandy Three Cliffs Bay, one of the many jewels of the Gower Peninsula, the UK's first designated Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty.

Celtic Manor's golfing pedigree speaks for itself. The 7,493-yard Twenty Ten course shot to fame as the host of one of the most exciting Ryder Cups in living memory, with Europe clinching a onepoint victory in the final singles match of the competition. A round here is both an exacting test of your game and a chance to walk in the footsteps of golfing giants. Here's your chance to discover if you could have sunk the 17th green putt Graeme McDowell holed to seal the competition for Europe in 2010.

But The Twenty Ten is not the only game in town. Celtic Manor's other two world-class championship courses give it a serious run for its money. The par-70 Roman Road was named best inland course in Wales by Golf Monthly and has competition pedigree of its own, most recently hosting the Wales Senior Open in 2015. The par-69 Montgomerie (designed by the Ryder Cup hero of the same name) transplants classic Scottish

links features to Wales, with yawning pot bunkers liberally sprinkled over its undulating terrain.

As epic as the golf is, it's when you step off the course that you're struck by what Celtic Manor Resort has to offer. Accommodation ranges from exquisitely appointed rooms in four different hotels to chic self-catering in the Hunter Lodges (think ski chalets with a golfing twist). Hungry? Take your pick from a menu of seven delectable restaurants. Once the stresses of the day have soaked away, enjoy classic recipes made with the freshest Welsh ingredients at the AA Rosette-winning Vale Grill, or wet your whistle at the bubbly, 1930s-themed Salamanza Champagne Bar.



South East Wales. As you'd expect of Wales's most populated region it has the largest number of golf courses a whopping 60-plus.

Ranging from some very big hitters indeed (think The Celtic Manor Resort) to warm and welcoming local clubs that epitomise the 'golf as it should be' ethos.

And it's all so accessible - just a couple of hours down the motorway from London. There's scenic variety too. Cross the Severn Bridge and you'll soon come to the wooded Wye Valley, an 'Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty'. Newport (home of a certain Ryder Cup victory) and Cardiff, our cosmopolitan capital, come next - they share between them nearly 30 clubs, so you're spoilt for choice on as well as off the course. Inland, the South Wales Valleys are rich in natural beauty and heritage - and there's more of the same along the untouched Glamorgan Heritage Coast.

Game on

With 15 clubs in and around the city, Cardiff has serious golfing capital. It's also the perfect base for exploring dozens of other clubs here in South Wales. And there's yet more superb parkland golf at nearby Cottrell Park Golf Resort's two courses. South West Wales. You're never far from the ocean's waves in this part of Wales.

And with 36 clubs spread out from Swansea Bay to the westernmost tip of Pembrokeshire, you'll be beside the sea with great golf as company.

Pembrokeshire is the second best coastal destination in the world. We didn't say that, the respected National Geographic magazine did. It's certainly home to the UK's only true coastalbased National Park - all 200 miles of it, a stunning shoreline of bays and beaches, headlands and coves. There's more coastal splendour along the Gower Peninsula, an 'Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty' and sandy Carmarthen Bay. Country lovers also get in on the act. Carmarthenshire's greens and greenery are appealing, not just in the golfing sense - there's a reason it's known as the 'garden of Wales'.

Game on

The area around Swansea and the Gower Peninsula is studded with golfing gems. There are 15 clubs in and around Swansea alone. These include Pennard. known as the 'links in the sky' thanks to its classic coastal features and the fact that it happens to be perched on a cliff some 200ft above sea level. Clyne occupies similarly spectacular seafront real estate, combining springy downland terrain with show-stopping ocean views. There's fun to be had inland too. At wooded Glynneath, night owls can even play a round of nocturnal golf.

The golfing bounty continues as you push west, taking in the gleaming Machynys Peninsula Golf and Country Club. Opened in 2005, it's one of Wales's youngest courses, but this Nicklausdesigned championship links track has already made a big name for itself. Machynys is the embodiment of a 21stcentury links course, but you'll find more traditional experiences at venerable clubs like Tenby and Ashburnham. The latter has an illustrious history of competition featuring players like Dai Rees, Sam Torrance and Harry Vardon, who labelled it the course he 'liked best in Wales'. Tenby's heritage stretches back to 1888, making it the 'oldest affiliated club in Wales'. It may be getting on a bit, but its lightning fast greens have lost none of their sparkle. 

Mid Wales. Red kites and green hills, forests and farmland characterise this peaceful, restful part of Wales.

But there's plenty on offer on Mid Wales's other green scene - 30 friendly golf clubs, ranging from classic links courses on Cardigan Bay to hidden gems along the Wales/England border.

You'll not be short of scenery either. The southern part of the Snowdonia National Park reaches all the way down to Machynlleth (in fact, 500 of its 840 square miles are within Mid Wales). There's more hilly countryside - smoother and even greener than Snowdonia - along the Welsh border. And filling the spaces between east and west, there's an untamed 'wild Wales' of moor and lakeland that's a no-go area even for hardy golf clubs. But you should go for its elemental beauty and the chance to spot wildlife, including the red kite.

Game on

You'll find some of the greenest greens in the country in lush Mid Wales. At parkland Cradoc, high-altitude views across the Brecon Beacons are that rare example of a welcome distraction from your golf. But don't take our word for it. Turn to pages 26-31 to find out what Golf World Senior Editor Kit Alexander thought. While you're there, you can also see how he got on at tree-lined Builth Wells and Harry Vardon-designed I landrindod Wells - the latter an unusual experiment in course architecture that transplants links features to a hilltop setting. Rocky Llanymynech

also occupies a lofty vantage point. Straddling the border between Wales and England, it's the only course where you'll tee off in one country and putt in another. Don't worry, you won't need your passport.

Lapped by the blue waters of Cardigan Bay, this part of Wales is also home to stunning coastal courses. There's Aberystwyth, another Vardon design and one of our many hidden gems (turn to pages 14-17 for more). Borth & Ynyslas stakes a claim to being Wales's oldest course. While not everyone agrees, it definitely offers a truly timeless outand-back links experience. Historic Aberdovev is another coastal classic. Only separated from the sea by a ridge of tumbling dunes, it's a salty experience that no links lover should dare to miss.

North Wales. The 50 clubs here are almost as varied as the scenery.

And that's saying something in a part of Wales where miles of sandy coastline are in the mix along with wooded hills and rocky mountains.

Did we mention mountains? There are lots of them - 15 peaks over 3,000ft in Snowdonia alone, while along the border the grassy hills of the Clwydian Range and Dee Valley are protected as an 'Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty'. AONBs also cocoon the pristine shores of the Isle of Anglesey and Llŷn Peninsula, keeping them as nature intended. North Wales is the UK's outdoor activities capital. So if you want more fresh air after your game of golf there's an A to Z of things to do (abseiling to zip-wire riding, since you ask).

Game on

It's two for one in the Victorian resort of Llandudno, with a pair of lovely links courses - North Wales and Maesdu lying just a golf ball's throw apart. While you're in the area, sample neighbouring Conwy too. The Open Qualifying links course is every bit as regal as Conwy Castle, a World Heritage Site just down the road. Set on a spear of rock jutting into the Irish Sea, iconic Nefyn & District is a one-of-a-kind golfing thrill - an almost nautical experience that has been likened to playing on the deck of an aircraft carrier. You'll also want to cross the Menai Strait to Anglesev and play Bull Bay - Wales's most northerly course. Aside from these big-hitters, there

are less well-known golfing gems just waiting to be discovered. The panoramic sea views at hilltop Criccieth enchant all who play here, while Abersoch blends links and parkland into a delicious golfing recipe all of its own. Turn to pages 16-19 where we reveal more of our hidden treasures. Follow in the footsteps of legendary course designer James Braid and play the 10 clubs that make up North Wales's very own James Braid Trail. And don't miss out on scenic Vale of Llangollen, a genuine contender for best inland course in the country.

Best of the West

The Pembrokeshire Coast National Park and Ceredigion Heritage Coast are renowned for their untouched seascapes and rich wildlife. Walkers rave about the coast path that runs around south-west Wales. Golfers love these uplifting surroundings too when they play a variety of courses that charm and challenge in equal measure.

How long - Three days

Where to stay - Stay south or north? You choose. Tenby has a great choice of accommodation, including dormy rooms at the club itself. You can also stay on-site, so to speak, at Trefloyne or Newport Links.

Making the cut - The picturesque South Pembrokeshire resort of Tenby, ringed by medieval town walls, is the ideal gateway to the entire region. Its


golf club, founded in 1888, lays a claim to being the birthplace of Welsh golf. It's a pure links classic, a James Braid course laid out in natural golfing terrain of seawashed turf and sandy dunes. The holes are classy and short, the greens fast and true, the sea views stunning. It boasts excellent year-round playability thanks to the sandy links sub-soil ('When it rains it drains' could well be the club's motto). In Tenby it's a case of from old to new, links to parkland, in the blink of an eve. Neighbouring Trefloyne is a mere youth, founded in the 1990s. It's maturing nicely as a top-rated course.

Further west, Milford Haven Golf Club's rolling parkland course epitomises the 'golf as it should be' ethos. It's very welcoming, with good-value green fees, holes that test golfers of all levels, an excellent layout and good conditions, and glorious views of the Milford Haven waterway.

The rugged, away-from-it-all North Pembrokeshire coast is very different from the south. One of the best places to compare the two is from the headland course overlooking the Nevern Estuary at Newport. This challenging links course has many fans - and has attracted lots more since 2008 when an additional nine holes were added and luxury accommodation came on stream. elevating it to a desirable golfing resort.

You'll leave Pembrokeshire and enter Ceredigion for Cardigan Golf Club, an arresting blend of links, heath and clifftop golf. It's another of those unsung courses that surprise and delight. Again – something of a theme with this itinerary - the views are superlative. Veteran US golf writer Furman Bisher compared the views over the Teifi Estuary with those at Pebble Beach. But do they have as many dolphins as Cardigan Bay?





North Stars

Scenic North Wales is famous for its lively seaside resorts and rugged green valleys. The golf is pretty good too, with an appetising choice of links and parkland courses vying for your attention.

How long - Four days

Where to stay – Llandudno has the largest choice of graded accommodation in Wales. And it's got excellent transport links to make ensure get to your game on time.

Making the cut – You need venture no more than a mile or so from the Victorian resort town of Llandudno to find three outstanding courses. The undisputed 'Queen of the Welsh resorts' has kept her looks and character over the years – the promenade and pier







are as pristine today as they were when created over 150 years ago.

Let's start with some links. North Wales (Llandudno) Golf Club, on Llandudno's West Shore, is a true links challenge, a natural course that commands respect as well as superb views across the Conwy Estuary to the mountains of Snowdonia. It's best known for its duo of criss-cross par threes on the 16th and 17th. 'They may be pretty short holes but most golfers would pay good money to par both with any sort of breeze blowing,' says Jeremy Elwood from Golf Monthly magazine.

Maesdu (Llandudno) Golf Club runs almost alongside, though this is parkland golf with links thrown in. The gently undulating course, designed by Tom Jones (no, not that one) and James Braid, is varied, versatile and suitable for all abilities. And it comes with more of those stunning sea and mountain views.

Conwy is the venue for your third golfing experience. It's another classic links course, the first club in Wales to have the honour of hosting a qualifying round for the Open Championship. This 'must-play' course is no stranger to prestigious competitions and invariably attracts praise for its challenge, presentation and condition. 'It is a course where you have to think off the tee,' is typical of competitors' comments.North Wales isn't just about the coast.

Head inland to **Vale of Llangollen** and you'll be rewarded with one of Wales's golfing gems. This tree-lined, parkland course laid out alongside the River Dee offers a stern test for even the most able golfers. The ninth is its signature hole, a 439-yard par-four aptly known as The River. Played with the water at your right towards a hole which doglegs to the left, an unsuccessful tee shot can end up in the submerged Dee's currents.

Heart Of Wales

You're guaranteed to fall in love with this itinerary. Not only do you travel through some of Wales's loveliest countryside but you'll also enjoy golf of the highest standard on three great (and very green) courses.

How long - Two or three days


Where to stay – There's a varied range of accommodation on offer in Brecon, Builth Wells and Llandrindod Wells – from large country house hotels to cosy guesthouses and welcoming inns.

Making the cut - Make for Brecon, the handsome Georgian town at the heart of the Brecon Beacons National Park. Just a few miles north you'll come to Cradoc, a parkland course laid out on a prominent hill. The first thing that hits you is the view. It's stunning. The southern horizon is dominated by the distinctive, flat-topped summit of Pen y fan, the highest peak in the Beacons. The golf is just as eye-catching. Cradoc's mature, tree-lined fairways are specially designed to make the most of its rolling, hilly location. It's classy golf, where rough stuff is kept to a minimum and the welcome at the 19th hole epitomises the friendly, unstuffy spirit of 'golf as it should be', Welsh-style.

Next comes **Builth Wells**, over a hill or two (or three) to the north. You're in the

true Welsh heartlands here, surrounded by tranquil farming country and in a market town that hosts one of Europe's largest country jamborees, the Royal Welsh Show, held each July. Like Cradoc this highly regarded, well-groomed parkland course is noted for more of those wonderfully wide Welsh vistas (see if you can spot a red kite circling above enjoying a bird's-eye view) and smooth, true putting greens. It's one of those 'hidden gems' that delights all who discover it, with a good use of natural features like woodland, ponds and riverbanks.

Last but not least comes another 'Wells'. this time Llandrindod ('Llandod' if you're a local). The town of Llandrindod Wells is a Victoriana personified – it's a complete inland resort, purpose built as a spa town in Victorian times with all the period features. You can still 'take the waters' - and also take to the hills for some exciting and unusual golf. Llandrindod's airy course has been described intriguingly as 'upland links'. Designed by Harry Vardon and altered some time later by James Braid (two of the best, we think you'll agree), it's a mix of lush upland turf, banks and natural hazards with well-protected greens. If involving, links-style golf played in rolling hills (with more of those fabulous Mid Wales views) is your thing, then Llandod is a must-visit.









The Beautiful South

You'll be playing world-class golf within a few miles of crossing the M4 Severn Bridge into Wales. The Celtic Manor Resort, host of The 2010 Ryder Cup, is just the start of it all. Wales's green, rolling border country is studded with golfing gems.

How long - Three/four days

Where to stay - Book into The Celtic Manor Resort or Marriott St Pierre, two easily accessible bases for exploring all of south-east Wales.

Making the cut - You've seen it on TV. Now's your chance to play at The Celtic Manor Resort, just off the M4 on the approach to Newport. But which course? The Montgomerie, perhaps? Or the Roman Road? Or follow in the footsteps of your golfing heroes and play the Twenty Ten, the only course purpose built for a Ryder Cup competition. They are all superb championship courses offering a golfing rollercoaster of thrills and challenges set in 2,000 acres of panoramic parkland. And, to cap it all, you have the resort complex itself, one of Europe's finest, with luxury accommodation, fine dining, a stateof-the-art spa, clubhouses, a floodlit golf academy, driving range, pro shops, fishing, shooting, mountain biking and walking. Golf with all the extras doesn't get any better than this.

If you cross the Severn Estuary on the original Severn Bridge using the M48 you'll soon come to Marriott St Pierre, near Chepstow. To give it its full title, Marriott St Pierre Hotel and Country Club is another premium golfing destination. With two top parkland courses - the 7,028-yard Championship Old Course and 5,730-yard Mathern Course - plus a golfing academy, it has hosted many prestigious competitions including 11 European Tour events and the Solheim Cup.

Head into those inviting velvety hills for - forgive the pun - a Rolls Royce of a course. It's the Rolls of Monmouth Golf Club, a magnificent championship parkland course within the Rolls Estate, former home of motoring pioneer and aviator Charles Stewart Rolls.

co-founder of the esteemed margue. The course lives up to its name, with lush, top-quality greens, fairways and surroundings that include many fine specimen trees.

You're in a very foodie part of Wales – award-winning restaurants and inns abound, especially around Abergavenny (home to a famous food festival). So when you're heading for the Monmouthshire Golf Club you can look forward to mouthwatering food as well as tasty golf. Monmouthshire is another fine parkland course - in this case designed by the great James Braid - that's one of the oldest in Wales. Set amongst mountain and riverside scenery in the verdant Usk Valley, it's a superb example of mature parkland golf that can be as tough as it is beautiful.

Mother Tongue

When the Romans arrived in Britain. every person in what is now England and Wales spoke the same language: Welsh (or at least, British, the Celtic language from which modern Welsh is descended). Successive invasions from mainland Europe drove the British language to the western edges of Britain, where it evolved into Welsh, Cornish and the now-extinct Cumbric. The language also hopped across to north-west France, where the Breton language is still partly intelligible to Welsh speakers.

Nowadays Welsh is spoken by around a fifth of the population, especially in the north and west of Wales, where it is many people's everyday working language. You'll also hear quite a bit of Welsh in major towns and cities like Cardiff, where the government and all major public bodies are fully bilingual. So if you want to know what our ancient British ancestors sounded like, just find your nearest Welsh speaker and say shwmae!

A sense of place

Place names tell a story in Wales. You'll see the same words appear time and again on our road signs, and they'll always tell you something of the local history or landscape. Two in particular appear very often: Llan indicates a church or parish, usually followed by the name of the saint to whom it's dedicated. as in Llandudno: the church of St Tudno. Aber means the mouth or confluence of a river, as in Aberaeron: the mouth of



Bv Rail

In the UK, fast and frequent rail services run between London Paddington and Cardiff, taking just over two hours. There is a half-hourly departure to Cardiff Central, with an hourly continuation to Swansea and onward connections to West Wales

There are also direct trains from London Euston and Manchester to Llandudno, Bangor and Holyhead: from Birmingham, Shrewsbury and Crewe to the North Wales coast and the Llŷn Peninsula; from Manchester and Shrewsbury to Newport; and from Portsmouth, Southampton and Salisbury to Cardiff.




